

## Linguistic Landscape in the Spanish-Speaking World (SPA 602)

## Spring 2026 — Tuesdays, 2:00–4:30 p.m. | Patterson Office Tower, Room 1145

This graduate seminar explores the **linguistic landscape** as a sociolinguistic method for analyzing the visible presence of languages in public spaces across the Spanish-speaking world. Through case studies from Spain, Latin America, and bilingual contexts in the U.S., students will examine how written signs, advertisements, graffiti, and digital landscapes reflect broader issues of **language policy, identity, migration, and power**. The course combines theoretical readings with field-based and digital ethnography projects, enabling students to design and conduct their own linguistic landscape research.
